I remember reading this verse while I was in a time of prayerful discernment—seeking to hear God's voice speak over my life as to whether becoming a Co-Lead Pastor at Spring Garden was the Lord's will for me and the church. A number of months before that Margaret Sutton, our then recently retired Pastor of Seniors and Pastoral Care, told me that when she prayed for me Joshua 1:9 always came to mind: "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord Your God will be with you wherever you go." When I read the Corinthians passage while seeking God's leading, I felt it was an important verse for me to hear personally.

Now I have been in the role with Sam for over a year, at first as interim and, as of last December, as 'permanent' (really what is permanent besides the love of God?). Over and throughout that time I have regularly come back to those verses and cannot think of a more succinct and apropos way of expressing the hopes, challenges, and encouragements of the past year. For myself and perhaps for all of us.

Be on your guard: "Be alert" is another translation. Be watchful, eyes open. Not just for potential challenges and difficulties, but watching and aware of changes and new pathways that God presents for us. Being aware of the movement of the Spirit in worship, in the community and in the neighbourhood. Oh my goodness has COVID-19 ever given cause to be alert and on guard, open to change and willingness to flow with current realities!

Stand firm in the faith: The faith that Jesus is truly the light of the world and the living bread; that his life, death, resurrection and ascension is our hope in the midst of great suffering, illness and upheaval; the faith that the Holy Spirit is with us, guiding us and bearing fruit in us.

Be courageous: I think it's true for many of us during this world wide pandemic to say that each and every day requires courage. I need the regular reminder

that God says "you can be courageous, because I am with you", and this hope keeps me going.

Be strong: Like courage, my strength does not come from myself, but from the One who is more present to me than I am to myself—a daily reminder that we can take another step forward because God's power is made perfect in our weakness.

**Do everything in love:** All of our alertness, all of our faith, all of our courage and all of our strength is for one purpose, one goal, and stems from one Source: I ove.

Sam and I have sought together to be watchful and alert, and to lead together through the unknowns of this time in adapting to the constant changes; we have sought to stand firm in the faith—our personal faith which is the faith of the Church—and to teach, pray, sing, serve and express that faith in a way that shares the hope, joy, and peace of Jesus with you all. We have prayerfully sought courage and strength to do so, and above all we have sought to come back, again and again, to our primary call to love. And of course, we have been imperfect, and done all this imperfectly! But we have done it with a thanksgiving to God for you and for the opportunity to serve in this way.

I am also aware that, more than anything we've given, we have received from you as a family love that brings us strength, courage, and faith. We have received this from the amazing Leadership team of Deacons, Elders, and the rest of the pastoral team (Jeremy and Dale, and Lily when she was with us). And we've received this from all of you as we have laboured alongside one another, serving Christ and the church. So thank you!

Speaking of doing everything in love, one beautiful place where I have seen this so strongly in our community was, when COVID-19 and the ramifications of isolation hit Toronto, so many of you were willing to step up to show practical acts of care for others. While it is fortunate that we did not have extreme need from too many, the willingness and the ways that many of you have cared for others has been a beautiful expression of the love of Jesus in Toronto. This value of caring for others is expressed of course not only in this team of people offering, but from the church as a whole, particularly through our Caring and Sharing Offering that goes to those in financial need. That this is a priority for us as a community speaks volumes to your heart to care for others.

In December, we held a special congregational meeting to vote on Greg and I being the co-lead pastors of Spring Garden. The vote was passed with a very strong majority of 95.5%. I want to thank everyone who was involved in this long process of discerning God's will for us and this new model of ministry. From the deacons, to the IMC team to that of the 3C team, there were many people who were involved in this discernment process. Greg and I are grateful to God and to you for your support and desire to see us lead. In the new year, during our

Ministry Envisioning and Budget meeting, we approved the call of making Jeremy Ranasinghe as our full-time Pastor of Children, Youth & Young Adults. We also increased Dale's hours and approved the budget to provide room to hire another full-time staff person. Though the pandemic has changed the timeline of this new hire, we are still planning to go ahead with creating a job description so that we will be ready to hire as the pandemic ends.

Since the pandemic, the team has done a great job of adapting and working under the pressure and stress of this time. It has been great to see how the team came together each week to seek God and to respond to the ever-changing circumstances that surround us. I want to thank Colin, Wes, Monica, Brandon, and Kevin who all played a significant role in making sure that we could have our online worship gatherings. Without their help, we would not be able to do what we do every Sunday!



# Leadership

One of the highlights with Deacons this year was at our first fall Deacon's meeting. Every year, we take time to think through which portfolio each Deacon will be responsible for. This year, we took time to use the discernment process in the distribution of responsibilities. It was a great process to be a part of and I am grateful for the openness and willingness of our Deacons to be led by God in this way. It highlighted the desire for us to seek God's will in all things.

Our Elders continue to be faithful in providing spiritual leadership and guidance for us. They meet monthly to pray for the congregation and for any other areas that need prayer. They provide pastoral care and support to the congregation but also to the pastoral team.

Every quarter, the leadership team of Deacons, Elders, and Pastors meet to discern together how God is moving in the church and in our community. This year was no different in that we spent much time discerning the new model of leadership and the makeup of our pastoral team. I am so thankful to be part of a church where we are intentional in meeting together to collaborate, to listen to God, and to listen to one another.

# Children & Youth Discipleship Ministries

#### Ministry Volunteers

#### Intergenerational Ministry

We believe that intergenerational ministry is necessary for us to be a healthy church community. Therefore, we continue to gather together as an intergenerational community to worship and be the church. One of the ways in which we enact this is through our intergenerational worship. I



am very thankful to the Creative Team that plan and organize these worship gatherings. It takes a lot of creativity and maturity to create our prayer stations. Great job everyone and thank you!

#### **Engaging Parents**

We continue to believe that the best way for us to disciple our children and youth is through partnering with the whole family. This year we provided a few different ways of engaging and empowering our families. On November 1, we had a joint intergenerational event with CBOQ Kids. On November 23, we had our Night Out for our parents and caregivers where we provided childcare. We had 40 children who were babysat which provided some relief for 19 households. On February 2, we had our Faith at Table led by Amelia Bowler where she used art to help families have healthy conversations. I am thankful for her gifts and for providing resources to our families.

# **Community Life**

Another area that has been part of my responsibility for the past season is in the area of community life. I want to thank Martin Dewar who was our Community Life Deacon this year who provided much support in this area. Here are some highlights from the past year.



#### Weekly Coffee Time

Thank you for all the volunteers who run this time of fellowship every week. This weekly time is one significant way in which we build community and we are thankful for all those who help in this area.

#### Camping Trip

This past July, we had our annual camping trip to Pinery Provincial Park. We had 59 people attend and it was a blast!

#### **Newcomers Lunch**

This was a new event that we tried this past February. It was a great way to welcome those who have been part of our community in the past year and to connect them with some of our seasoned Spring Gardeners!

#### Neighbourhood Potluck



We had our second neighbourhood potluck at the end of February. We gathered around four different homes with over 40 people around the city for a time of food and fellowship. It was a good way for us to gather together as the church in people's homes.

This year has been a very different year. As we are still in the pandemic, it is hard to recall what life was like before. But as we spent some time reflecting, there was much life before and much life to be had. In the reflection, it is evident that God has been faithful in the past and God will be faithful in the future. Even now as we are in the present, we know that God is faithful even when we might not feel it. We know we can trust in this God who is a faithful God. So, we trust in His faithfulness and look to what He will continue to accomplish through Spring Garden in the days ahead.



# Jeremy Ranasinghe Children & Youth Pastor

Normally as I get to this time of year, I'm in awe of how fast it feels the months have gone by. However, as I write this, September feels like a long time ago. The pandemic has made life feel strange for a lot of us. It has also drastically impacted how we live and do life with one another. This in turn, has affected our ministry as a church. Regardless of the situation, I wholly believe that God works in the midst of hard situations like the ones we currently face, and He brings the good out of it. In the following I will be highlighting some of what God has done in the ministries I lead prior to COVID and what is on the horizon for us moving forward.

Earlier this year, both Sam and Greg were voted as Co-Lead Pastors of the church. Following that decision, I was voted in as a Pastor full-time where I continued in my responsibilities leading the Children and Youth Ministry. The long term plan is for my role to also consist of a Young Adult ministry. However, as Lily Cheng's contract came to an end, her responsibilities were split between the rest of the staff. In the meantime, until the next Pastor is hired, I have also taken on the Spring Garden Initiatives.

# Youth Ministry



Our youth ministry is made up of 4 components, Fellowship nights, Life-Groups, Sunday Gatherings, and Student Leadership (a pilot project introduced this year). In each area, the ultimate desire is to aid youth in their journey as they become lifelong followers of Jesus.

Our fellowship nights focus on building and nurturing healthy relationships between both leaders and youth. Life Group meetings are intended to create a safe space to foster those

relationships further as we share in doing life together. This year we planned on combining our Life-Groups with serving our community, however those plans were put on hold due to the pandemic.

Sunday Gatherings had an emphasis on teaching. In this space we work through the same sermon series as the adult congregation, however the conversation was catered to be more relevant for the youth.

Towards the end of June 2019, there was an expressed desire by a significant number of our Sr High youth, to go deeper in their faith. The Student Leadership team is a pilot project that was created to offer youth in high school, leadership opportunities with a focus on discerning God's will for our youth group. Youth in this position do not take on the full responsibility of a youth leader, however they are given decisive roles in the direction and operation of our youth ministry.

Under my guidance as well as other adult leaders, we use the discernment practice in Pursuing God's WIII Together by Ruth Haley Barton. This is the same discernment practice that our church leadership uses. This practice allows us to navigate the needs and direction of our youth group as we seek the lead of the Holy Spirit. The Student Leadership position is offered to all youth from grades 9-12.

# **COVID Adjustments**

Looking back on the last 10 months, there were many plans and desires that I had for our youth. As plans changed, we were only able to experience a small portion of them. As the reality of the pandemic began to settle in, how we functioned as a youth group required us to adapt quickly. We began by shifting our scheduled youth events to an online format. The format of our programming changed and I developed new immersive games for our youth. Building a healthy community under normal circumstances can be difficult, adding in dynamics of virtual meetings and other pandemic-related changes can make it all the more challenging. We are continuing to adjust and shift the ways that we are doing youth ministry to serve our youth and keep them engaged and connected. The programming is not what drives our youth group. The relationships and community that we have fostered drive our youth group. We know that as we adapt, this is what will continue to drive us forward, together.

We now meet online a few times a week. On Fridays we alternate between fellowship focused or "fun" online events, and a study on the book of Galatians. We also meet on Sundays at 1pm to catch up and split into our life groups. Our Student Leader group meets every other Thursday where we continue to discuss and discern how to better foster an online community. One way we hope to accomplish that is by hosting a Minecraft server this summer. In hosting this server, we hope to create a safe and monitored online space specifically for our youth. Youth will then be able to remotely log into the game to interact with one another and build a world using in-game resources.

# Children's Ministry

Every year I am thankful for the volunteers we partner with who are dedicated to loving and discipling our children. I am encouraged by their dedication, creativity, and desire to express the love God has for each person in a way that is both felt and understood by our kids. As we began this ministry year, we continued with the organization of age groups as we had last year, with some minor adjustment to the older grades. This year the groups we had were the Nursery, 2-3 Year olds (Toddler/Pre-K), JK/SK, Grade 1, Grades 2&3, Grades 4&5.

During the pandemic transition, we cancelled all in person gatherings, including our children's worship on Sundays. Our kids are currently meeting online on Wednesday evenings between 7:00 pm and 7:30 pm. During our Wednesday Hangouts, Jen Chrystman and Diana Boisvert have volunteered their time to meet with children. Together we have the opportunity to catch up and discuss a children's ministry video provided by the Meeting House which allows the children to continue learning more about God and their relationship with him.

# Spring Garden Based Initiatives

This year, even in the midst of the pandemic, and despite the fact that some of our plans had to be cancelled, we are still looking forward to a number of community initiatives. Unfortunately, our annual lasagna making event had to be cancelled. We have also placed the Summer Yard Sale temporarily on hold as we await further updates from the government. However, there are some wonderful moments from this year that deserve to be highlighted:

#### Light of the World

In December we enjoyed the fun that surrounds our annual Light of the World

event. As we invited our friends and neighbours to a safe and fun evening filled with Christmas music, and

filled with Christmas music, and various entertainment, we were able to celebrate the season with those who would not normally do so in a church building. Light of the World was one of my first experiences at Spring Garden and is something I look forward to each year. It is also one of the events that I think really speaks to who we are as a community of people following Jesus. This year



we got to watch a professional hula-hooper use the talents that God gave her, to amaze and entertain us with her skills. We also enjoyed the musical talents of some of SGC's very own musicians.

#### Art and Bake Sale

In March we hosted our third annual youth Art and Bake Sale to support the work of Fight4Freedom and our local missionary, Kaitlyn Ranasinghe. The event was planned and executed by our youth and raised over \$1200 for Fight4Freedom's efforts in supporting survivors of sex trafficking.

#### Bike Blessing:

Every year we tae a moment to bless bikes, walkers, scooters, and similar modes of transportation as well as the people who use them. We do this because we value the creation that God has given us. Using these forms of transportation not only allows us to be present in creation, but it allows us to care for it as well. While we won't be able to celebrate this occasion the same way we have in the past, we decided it was still important for us to do. And so we decided to bless these modes of transportation during our virtual worship on June 7th, 2020.











# The Deacon's Board

The Board of Deacons is elected by Members of the Spring Garden congregation to oversee "the administrative and temporal affairs of the Church". We meet on the second Tuesday of each month to discuss various matters of church business related to the annual operating budget, the church property, staffing and personnel issues, church ministries and missions, and membership.

This year, the Board of Deacons was made up of: Krysten Cameron (Vice Chair and Secretary), Sam Chaise (Finance), Martin Dewar (Community Life – social events and Coffee hour), Monica Kim (Membership and Pastoral Care), Joanne Laing (Missions), Shannon Loewen (Chair and Discipleship), Jeff McGee (Adult Ministries), Peggy Moore (Property).

This year, in addition to matters pertaining to the everyday operations of the church, the Deacons spent much of our time focused on overseeing the church's transition to a co-lead model. In October, we received a report from the 'Interim Management Committee' (comprised of an Elder, three Deacons, and our co-lead pastors), who were responsible for assisting with the church's management through the transition period and evaluating the co-leadership model in terms of its long-term potential, that recommended moving forward and making the co-lead model permanent. Through discussion and prayer with the full leadership team the deacons moved that the co-lead model be moved and then presented for a vote with the SGC membership. Once the Co-lead model was voted in we began the process of changing our by-laws to fit with the new leadership and are excited to present their adjustments to the community.

As a Board, we have also continued to look at matters related to budget (including consideration of special projects or expenses outside of our approved annual budget), existing and proposed ministries, our role in local and global mission initiatives, maintenance of and upgrades to our property, and staffing and personnel matters. Regarding the latter, we approved increasing Jeremy Ranasinghe's hours to full time, and we called Jeremy into the role of pastor. We continue to work closely with Sam and Greg on fulfilling another staff position and calling forth a search committee.

This is year has been full of joys and trials. As we journey together in this new space in SGC with our leadership structure, but also the effects that are yet to be seen with COVID-19, I am confident that we will see God's provision and love through everything that we face together. It is a joy to serve alongside one another and to serve the church in this way. In closing, I'd like to thank the Deacons who will be finishing their 3-year terms this June: Sam Chaise and Peggy Moore. We also thank Sam and Peggy for continuing on into early fall as consultants with the new board as we navigate through COVID-19. (Thanks

also to Joanne Laing who has agreed to extend her term by one year in order to provide some continuity to the Board.) Thank you for your faithful service, for your thoughtful contributions, and for your prayerful presence on the Board. It is a privilege to serve alongside you all and I look forward to welcoming our new deacons to the board and serving with them. Please continue to pray for the Deacons as we move forward together in managing the church resources. May God grant us discernment, wisdom, unity, and joy as they serve unity, and joy as they serve.

At present we are primarily focused on helping SGC navigate the uncertain and disruptive season we are currently journeying through. The challenges to our church life together as a result of the pandemic are many, but we are also seeing small mercies from the hand of God.

We give thanks to God for his faithfulness, his protection, and his guidance. May his Spirit continue to guide us, to protect us, and to enable us to grow in grace.

Our strategy is to understand first what scripture would have meant to its original readers, and then think about how it applies to us today. We also want to see each passage in its wider context, and to get the big picture of the Bible's story. To this end we do an in-depth study of a biblical book. Participants are encouraged to feel free to share different views, thoughts and opinions while respecting other perspectives. We want to know the scriptures, but also to become better disciples of Christ through them.

When we are close to finishing a particular book, we normally decide as a group which book(s) will be our next project. We don't meet during July and August, but we are hoping that we will be able to resume in September and would be happy to have others join us when we do restart!

# IT/AV Committee

The IT/AV Committee coordinates the technology requirements for audio/visual needs at church which often span different church ministries and departments. We try to meet at least once a year to discuss, recommend and coordinate the technical aspects of supporting church ministry. This year, we did not find time to meet because Kevin was too busy. Not much was done this year, until COVID19 hit.

There has been some explorations on giving the church AV systems a brand new overhaul. We are currently in the planning stages still.

The front office requested some upgrades to the monitors for graphic design, so a 4K high quality monitor was purchased for Dale's great multimedia work. Greg got a new, fast laptop for portable work (before we knew the pandemic was coming). Some software was purchased to go along with some of the office work. The boardroom TV, PC, and webcam came in handy this year for Zoom meetings which facilitated the Interim Management Committee meetings during the pastoral team transitions.

The installation of the security cameras at the church was initiated by the church office and property department, but did not involve the IT/AV Committee. When Kevin was eventually informed of this installation, he met with the pastoral team to discuss the implications, and then proceeded to negotiate with them on modifying the installation to address some privacy and security concerns. The topic of privacy, security, and surveillance will need further ongoing discussions by the church leadership.

COVID19 pandemic changed how the church delivered its Sunday Service and ministries in a matter of a week. Jeremy, Brandon and Colin (with Kevin's last minute troubleshooting network issues) managed to rapidly deploy streaming services that rivalled professional setups. There has also been some equipment and software purchase decisions that were made quickly in order to adapt to this new way of doing church. The IT/AV Committee will be supporting this important ministry as we move forward.

Fortunately, Kevin had the foresight that remote work was coming before the pandemic started, and had already positioned the IT systems for secure VPN, portable VoIP extensions, clientless Remote Desktop, and cloud file sharing. This enabled him to support the pastoral team, despite being busy himself with pandemic preparations for his medical clinic moving to virtual care. Unfortunately, there are now a backlog list of tech requests that will have to wait while the pandemic occupies our time and energy.

In the past, most of our support from the AV team, and digital or print media designs were done by our wonderful church volunteers. However, this means also we rely on volunteers to help troubleshoot technical issues for the office staff when problems arise. If anyone is interested in serving in this area of IT, AV, or

media arts, please let us know! We need more help in managing the day-to-day issues that arise, designing and publishing media, as well as special projects.

# Resource Centre

Report from Karen Cassel

The Resource Centre provides books, videos, and DVDs for general Christian growth, study, and leisure. The library resources are provided to speak to the needs and events that are taking place in the wider church life. Reading materials are an invaluable resource for personal and spiritual growth. We are able to offer important resources that cannot be found in the public library system.

We are so fortunate to have a book budget and have the ability to purchase books to meet our objectives, and to support the teachings we enjoy each Sunday.
