# "What's with this art?" Illuminating the meaning behind our Lent image

More than most images we create for our worship series, we have had many people ask us wondering what it is about. Below are three different answers: a quick and easy one, a slightly more detailed one, and a longer more complex one. You have the autonomy to choose which one(s) you want to read (how very Baptist of me)

# Quick and Easy:

Jesus (see the cross?) is fully God (see the heavens?) and fully human (see the earth and sky?)

### Slightly more detailed:

The bible tells us that Jesus who was fully God "emptied himself taking the form of a slave, assuming human likeness" (Philippians 2:7a). The cross, representing Jesus, stands outside of and other-than creation (represented by circles, clouds, etc.) while simultaneously standing within the created order as a human (represented by sun, moon, stars, trees, lakes, etc.). In other words, Jesus is fully divine and fully human.

### More complex version:

One aspect of my job that I really love is working with the Creative Team to imagine how to create visual and physical manifestations of the abstract concepts of a worship series. What would it look like to draw a picture of God's grace? Or design a space to reflect the main message of the book of Hebrews or 1 John?

Or, as in our current worship series in the season of Lent - the

40 days leading up to Easter weekend - creating a physical set up that gives image to the fullness of God being emptied out and taking on human flesh as found in Philippians 2:7; Jesus pouring himself out for the sake of humanity, the world, and the cosmos. To give image to this emptying out, which can also be thought of as pouring out, on the platform we have a jar pouring out water into a basin. The jar symbolizes Jesus and the water symbolizes Jesus being poured out. The jar and water have a secondary meaning as they also represent Jesus' act of servanthood when he takes the role of a slave and washes the disciples' feet, telling them to do likewise.



For music to accompany our focus (listen to in now at https:// youtu.be/E1ISe52LnvI), we wanted something that gave sound to Jesus' self-emptying in this season of Lent; something that expressed a mixture of mournfulness, contemplativeness, and hope. In an effort to do this, Brandon Quek (electric guitar, programming and producing), Mike Penner (upright bass) and I recorded a song called "Emptied". We used 'organic' sounding instruments such as accordion, acoustic guitar, strings, upright bass, and raw sounding electric guitar to give an earthiness to the sound. To musically portray the 'downwards mobility' of Jesus and the "first shall be last, the last shall be first" nature of his self-emptying we made two instrument choices. First, the song features a tin-can ukulele, an instrument made out of old tin cans. It was made by a man who was living on the streets and who started making instruments out of garbage that he found in order to make money for food and housing. Secondly, the melody of the verses is played on the bass, an instrument which, though foundational to any band, is often a hidden member of the band and is rarely given the melody.

To go along with this, we also had the fun challenge of creating an image that reflects the beautiful mystery that in this self-

emptying/pouring out, Jesus is fully God and fully human, an idea that is often referred to as the "dual natures of Christ"; designing an image which reflects how we cannot contemplate these 'two natures' as two separate and opposing natures that simply co-exist at the same time, but that they together are one expression of who God the Son is. As German theologian Jurgen Moltmann writes in his book The Crucified God, as we contemplate the work of Jesus on the cross, "we must begin from the totality of the person of Christ," who is simultaneously and indivisibly both transcendent (beyond material existence and surpassing all comprehension) and immanent (right here with us, wearing the very dust of creation like the rest of us, closer to us than we even are to ourselves). In other words, to reflect on the "dual natures' of Christ", we have to contemplate them as a unified whole - Jesus in his totality—not as independent traits.

Additionally, as Moltmann argues, not only is it impossible to contemplate the dual natures of Christ independently, it is also impossible to truly contemplate who Jesus is separate from the cross, or to contemplate God the Father and the Spirit separate from the death of the Son (Jesus). In this way it could be said that through the self-emptying of Jesus, fully divine and fully human, at the cross we see the Son, Father and Spirit.

[as a side note, if that all sounds confusing and hard to understand, don't worry! Part of the point is portraying how hard and 'ungraspable' it all is]

To contemplate giving image to the cross existing simultaneously in material creation and ethereal (heavenly, celestial) divinity, it seemed apparent that it would be very difficult to do something with realism (art where what you create looks like it appears in real life). Looking for a concept that included symbolic representation of the heavens, images of the way ancient astronomy depicted the cosmos with circles came to mind. If you do an internet image search for "celestial spheres", you'll



see what I mean. A complex description is the mathematical model of the cosmos called the Ptolemaic system. As a more accessible description, though an oversimplification, "celestial spheres" is the understanding that the cosmos is a series of spheres or orbs, one inside the other, with the earth at the centre. Picture a giant



'jawbreaker' candy where a gum ball at the centre is surrounded by layer after layer of candy coating.

Looking into these images, we came across an image called the "Flammarion engraving". It is a wood engraving by an unknown artist first referenced by French astronomer Camille Flammarion in 1888. Flammarion writes about the Middle Ages understanding

that if you could reach the horizon, where the elliptic arch of the sky meets the earth, you would find the place where the earth and heavens meet. He writes that one Middle Ages voyager claims to have discovered a point in the horizon where the earth and heavens were not joined together, and so crouching down he was able to pass between heaven and earth. This is what the "Flammarion engraving" is depicting.

Like the mythical voyageur in the Flammarion engraving, Jesus passed between the barrier of heaven and earth when he 'crouched down', emptying himself and taking on human form, and died on the cross.

This is why in our image, based on the Flammarion engraving, the cross which represents Jesus is simultaneously on earth within creation and in the heavens within eternity.

Utilizing celestial spheres, clouds and lines to represent the heavens, and trees, lakes, stars and buildings to represent creation, Dale created this image in an art style based on the Flammarion engraving and Middle Ages artistic renderings of cosmology, digitally drawing it almost entirely by hand.

Amazing work Dale! And amazing work Creative Team (Clem Lee, Chloe Kay, Ben Kielstra) and Brandon Quek and Mike Penner for creating art that helps draw us into the mystery of Jesus' self-emptying.

# Love Those who are Foreigners Among You

After so many months (years!) of waiting, watching processing times, and praying for protection for the Raso family, it was hard to believe that Soleman, Nesren, Dawod, Abd and Rama had received an approval notice. Shortly after, the email to us, as the sponsor, came through, further confirming that it was finally real. It was happening, and soon!

There were so many preparations to make, none of which could have been started without knowledge of when they would arrive. Once they were approved, we were told to expect their travel to be booked in 7-12 weeks. That seemed like a quick turnaround until a few days later, we received notice of their actual arrival date - in about 5 weeks. Despite having been sitting on our heels for months on end, we suddenly needed to sprint!

Our motivation went beyond simple legal obligations as the sponsor of the family. Deuteronomy 10:17-19 says:

For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who shows no partiality and accepts no bribes. He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt.

If we were to truly reflect God's character in this situation, we needed to do our utmost to show them His love in practical ways. And so, we put out the call to you all, the congregation, letting

you know how we could show practical love to this wonderful family on whom we had been waiting for so long. And you stepped up in unbelievable ways! Within only a couple of weeks, our huge list of pantry and household items was filled with names of people willing to contribute, and we watched with joy as all the items were delivered to the church. When new big-ticket items popped up, there always seemed to be someone who was able to fill the need.

Once the apartment was secured on Thursday, February 1 and we were actually able to get inside, there were many volunteers who also gave of their time to make sure everything was ready for the Raso family's arrival. I was amazed at how seamlessly things seemed to flow. After Tarik, Soleman's brother living in Canada, obtained the keys, he and some friends moved the furniture that had been donated out of storage and into the apartment.



On Saturday, February 3, a smaller group of us attended the apartment with Tarik, to build some new furniture, arrange the rooms, and make a game plan for the next day, when all the smaller items would be delivered from the church.

On Sunday, February 4, everyone got to work without much prompting, loading up cars with all the donated pantry and household items. We filled at least 3 cars! Once we arrived, everything was taken up to the apartment, and people set to work wherever they saw a need - there was no prompting or instruction required. If there was an item sitting out, a bed that needed to be made, or dishes that needed to be washed and put away, it was attended to quickly and thoughtfully. It didn't matter how well we knew each other or how long we had been attending Spring Garden, we were united by a joint desire to truly make a home for a family that we had come to care about but never met. And within a mere couple of hours, the rooms had been converted into a home. Not a perfect one, as there were still a few little holes to fill, but still a welcoming one.

And just in time too! On Tuesday, February 6, Sam and I drove out to Pearson International Airport for the moment for which we had

all been waiting and praying. Thanks to an accident on the 401, there was some concern about making it to the airport in time, but thankfully, all those who were going to be in attendance were there and waiting. In addition to Sam and I, Alice was also in attendance, as was Tarik and two of his children, Rahaf and Ayman.

We knew the flight had landed and was at the gate, and we knew that there were customs and certainly immigration protocols to complete, but we just had no idea when they would finally exit those doors. After all this time, we found ourselves waiting again! I also had no idea what their arrival would be like. Would there be tears as a family was reunited permanently? Would they be too tired from their long journey? Would it be overwhelming for us to be there in addition to Tarik and his family? I just didn't know how to picture it!

But finally, Tarik's phone rang, and it was Soleman, trying to locate us. Then we spotted them on the other side of the gate doors, and waved so they would see us! Dawod came running our direction, and the family followed shortly after, waving back and

beaming with excitement! There are so very few instances in my life that I have witnessed such a pure joy, and I felt so privileged to be witnessing this one. As they came down the ramp and around to where we were waiting, and as Tarik proudly introduced each one of them to us, the feeling was just electric! After the introductions, we took some photos to commemorate the moment and to share with those of the Refugee Action Group who were not able to be there (and with you all, of course!).

And just like that, it was over. Tarik took them home for some much-needed food and rest. And yet, as I reminded myself on the drive home, it wasn't over. It is actually only the beginning! We had been justifiably focused on their approval and arrival up to this point. But it was important to remember that our year as a sponsor has just begun, and we want to do whatever we can to support the Raso family throughout the next year, financially and practically. Again, our call goes beyond meeting our basic legal obligations, but to continue to reflect God's character and his love in a meaningful and practical way.

If you would like to get involved, there is definitely still time! If you can help us support the Raso family financially, please consider donating to the refugee fund. As of the end of January, we still needed to raise about 20% of the funds required to support them for the full year based on our budget. If you would like to donate your time, being available to assist with various needs that the Raso family may have throughout the year, such as driving them to appointments, offering ESL support, socialising and connecting, tutoring, or other roles, please fill out our volunteer form, found at tiny.cc/rasovolunteer.

Finally, I want to personally thank all of you who have participated in big and small ways in this initiative up to this point. Whether you volunteered your time, offered to purchase or donate items, gave financially, or prayed over this family and their application, please know that your contribution is not overlooked - not by us in the Refugee Action Group, or by the Raso family. Also, Alice and her son Noah for their visits to us at home. We also thank the entire Spring Garden Church, one by one, for their care of us.

# Property Stewardship Team Update

Hello Spring Garden!

Our spaces at the corner of Spring Garden Avenue and Kenneth are where we as a church meet together to worship of God, for fellowship, youth events, newcomers' teas, Light of the World, and all the many parts of the life of our community. As stewards of these spaces, we are responsible to care for them.

The Property Stewardship Team has noted some large expenses that will need to be cared for in the near future: The East Lounge roof is in need of being replaced. The two air conditioning units on the East Lounge roof that cool the sanctuary and the boilers that heat the entire building are reaching end of life.

Given that the replacement of each of these improvements will be costly and that they will be 20 to 30 year investments in the property, we have been gathering information about the best and most efficient ways to replace the aging equipment.

The Property Stewardship Team is also seeking to make choices with our heating and cooling equipment that can reduce our carbon footprint, while also efficiently heating and cooling our spaces. To do so, we are seeking to establish where heat loss occurs in the building so we have a better idea of what capacity of heating and cooling is needed. Following that assessment, we will be creating a plan for replacing our boilers and air conditioners in a way that seeks to reduce carbon emissions and increases our energy efficiency. There are so many options and new technologies these days!

We wanted to inform the congregation about these forthcoming projects because the funding for these improvements falls outside of our annual church budget. That means we will need to raise the funding for these projects separate from regular giving to Spring Garden Church. Please pray for us and with us as we seek to make wise decisions about these improvements to our building. Our spaces are important places where we live our life together as the family of God in our part of the world and the city.

# Memories in, (and) Seasons of, Change - My Last Delve!

Since sharing my resignation letter a few Sundays ago, Kaitlyn, James and I have been met by a wave of love from many people. It has been wonderfully overwhelming.

Many have shared their experiences or thoughts on transitions similar to ours, and a few have inquired about our next steps. I thought I would share here that I don't have anything lined up next, and I'm feeling a strong peace about that. And I really mean it!

As I've been finishing up my role as one of your/our church's Pastors, I've also experienced a different kind of wave, made from all the memories I've accumulated in almost a decade of life as a part of this community.

These memories hold significant value for me and, for the most part, bring a sense of comfort and nostalgia as I remember them. Especially when I'm reminded of moments that I (and hopefully some of you) value and can remember fondly.

Like our paint pouring from the retreat last spring, or when we built the community garden a few years back. Or the loud and 13

obnoxious singing in our car rides to and from places with the youth (Bohemian Rhapsody still being my favourite!). All these and other moments have been where my head and my heart have been. There is so much sadness in the midst of these thoughts, but I think it's a good sad because it just means I love our church and everyone I've encountered here.

Honestly, it's a strange feeling to be writing any of this because looking back, I also remember who I was and how I used to be, and how between then and now, it feels like everything has changed. I've shared this a few times, but I never wanted to become a pastor, and it has been something I've struggled with and still struggle with to some degree.

Let me be clear and say, I love my job, and making the choice to resign has been one of the hardest things I've ever done because I love being part of this church and as one of your pastors! My struggle in wanting to be in this role came from all the insecurities I had and about what I thought that actually meant, "to be a Pastor".

I remember when I began to take my faith seriously when I was 17, at my church's fall youth retreat. I was with my youth leader, and he was helping me understand choosing to follow Jesus and having a relationship with God. There were a lot of feelings I was having from what he said, but I ultimately responded, saying "I'd do it, but only if I didn't have to be a pastor". My youth leader told me the truth and said I didn't have to, so I said awesome!

After high school, I set my "career aspirations" on being a police officer and enrolled in a program at Sheridan College, commuting while living with my parents. I wanted this because it made the most sense to me - a cop's job is to help people + God probably wants me to help people = the right choice (the money was also a factor).

In my last year there, I got into an intensive part of the program that was focused on more in-depth training and establishing relationships with different police services for faster recruiting. I was even offered a job straight out through connections I made, so things were all lining up.

But then, I felt a pull in a different direction (similar to what has led me to resign). One I thought I made an agreement with God about in choosing to follow Jesus and not having to be a Pastor, so it was frustrating that was a path to follow. It took me a bit, but I

made a switch and went to Tyndale and had very little support in doing so from my family, making this one of the hardest choices and times I've ever experienced, until now. It took a bit more time, but I eventually accepted my choices and followed what I felt from God, though begrudgingly.

The thing is, I've always been reluctant about Pastoral ministry, but that feeling has shifted, especially since I joined here as an intern.

When I first joined Spring Garden Church, I was in my early twenties and finishing my undergrad at Tyndale. I wanted to be a pastor in ministry at this point but only to work with kids and youth. The obvious (and my biassed) reason being kids and youth are more fun.

But over the years of being here with you and discerning God's will together, I've grown in some of the best ways possible. I've also worked with and gotten to know our other pastors who have helped reshape, define, and somewhat heal my understanding of what it means for me to be in ministry.

So it's still true that I don't have to be a Pastor, but God's shown me why I want to be through being one in this community. The thing is, I'm feeling God moving me to something different than youth and kids, and I'm not sure what that is yet (and would appreciate your prayers)!

But this peace I feel in leaving isn't just from blind faith and relying on God (though there is so much of that). It's also from having come this far in my journey and remembering how God was faithful to me the last time and brought me here and gave me the opportunity to discover the deeper parts of myself by being challenged by and living life with you.

These memories are reminders of what I would not have had or got to experience if I made different choices from the fear I had, instead of what I felt from God. If I went the police route, I would never have had my family, or experienced any of my time with anyone here, and missed out on the privilege of having these memories and friendships in the first place. I'd be another version of myself, and probably a lot less happy (present circumstances excluded).

I really believe our memories are important. They're not just the passing of our time or simple recollections of our past; in so many ways, memories are part of our individual and collective story as

we continue to learn and discover our identities as people made in God's image. Because we're all called and invited to be members of the Church, and we help each other know what that looks like in our journeying with each other.

In my time here with you, I really hope I've been someone who's helped you in your journey, because you've certainly helped me in mine.

In a lot of ways, I feel like I'm leaving home again after growing up, but this time I feel more confident not knowing where that'll be or what it'll look like. Because I trust God with whatever happens next, and have the love and support from this community, which has only helped me know that more. So thank you SGC, for everything!

Do you want to share something God is doing in your life or that you see God working around you? Something that could be a positive influence for the readers? A poem, story, art, photos...? We want to hear from you!


